ADVERBS VS ADJECTIVES

▪ **An adjective** is a word or set of words that **modifies a noun or pronoun.**

1. Adjectives may come before the word they modify.

*Example: That is a **cute** little baby!*

2. Adjectives may also follow the word they modify.

*Example: He is very **intelligent**.*

▪ **An adverb** is a word or set of words that **modifies verbs, adjectives, or other adverbs.**

*Example: She played the piano **beautifully**.*

▪ There are a number of adjectives/adverbs that take the same form. *Example: **Fast, hard, early, late, high, low, right, wrong, straight and long.***

▪ **Good & Well.** Good is an adjective. Well is an adverb.
